


St. Martha's Parish

2nd Sunday of Easter - April 7th 2024

Gospel Reflection - John 20:19-31



The disciples were locked in the house for fear of the Jews; house of darkness and fear, while outside it is spring: and Jesus came through closed doors and stayed in their midst, in the center of their fear, in the midst of them, not above them, not in front, but in the center, because everyone is equally important. He is at the center of the community, in the encounter, in the bond: "the Spirit of the Lord does not live in the 'I', not in the 'You', he lives between the I and the You" (M. Buber). In their midst, without sensational gestures, just being there: presence is the other name of love. Jesus does not accuse, He does not reproach, He does not abandon, He "is in the middle", a force of cohesion of the atoms and of the world. *Peace be with you*, He announces, like a caress on your fears, on your feelings of guilt, on your unachieved dreams, on the

sadness that discolors your days. The events of Easter are not simple "appearances of the Risen One", they are meetings, with all the splendor, the humility, the generative power of the meeting. Eight days later, Jesus is still there: He sent them out into the streets, and He finds them still locked in that same room. And instead of raising His voice or issuing ultimatums, instead of retreating due to the imperfection of those lives, Jesus comes to meet, accompanies the nascent faith of His disciples. *Look, touch, put your finger*... The Resurrection did not close the nail holes, it did not heal the wounds. Because death on the cross is not a simple accident to be forgotten: those wounds are the glory of God, the highest point that His crazy love has reached, and for this reason they will remain eternally open. He showed His disciples His wounds, all His humanity. And within Him was the whole divinity. *Put your hand here*: sometimes I get lost in imagining that perhaps one day I too will hear the same words, I too will be able to put, trembling, being led, blind with tears, put my hand into the heart of God. And feel beloved. Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed! The last beatitude is for us, for those who struggle, for those who grope, for those who do not see and stumble, for those who start again. This is how the Gospel ends, this is how our discipleship begins: with a blessing, with the scent of joy, with the risk of happiness, with a promise of life capable of crossing all the pain of the world, and the bloody deserts of history.

His Scars and Wounds – Proof of a Transformed Life

One of the truths about the resurrection is that Jesus' resurrection was physical not just spiritual or mystical. His disciples were able to touch, see, and hear Jesus' resurrected body with their own senses. By them experiencing his wounding of the crucifixion, Jesus was able to show solidarity with them that he can empathize with their own weaknesses, temptations, and trials (Heb. 2:18; Heb. 4:15), yet he overcame the world (John 16:33).

The archetypal encounter between doubting Thomas and the Risen Jesus (John 20:19-28) is not really a story about believing in the fact of the resurrection but a story about believing that someone could be wounded and also resurrected at the same time! That is quite a different message and still desperately needed.

"Put your finger here," Jesus says to Thomas (John 20:27). Like Christ, we are all indeed wounded and resurrected at the same time. In fact, this might be the primary pastoral message of the Gospel. Great love and great suffering (both healing and woundedness) are the universal, always available paths of transformation because they are the only things strong enough to take away the ego's protections and pretensions. Great love and great suffering bring us back to God; this is how Jesus himself walked humanity back to God. It is not just a path of resurrection rewards but a path that now includes death and woundedness. (Richard Rohr)


When we walk within our own spiritual journeys, God uses woundedness and resurrection as the means to transformation. This is evident when Thomas put his hands in Jesus scars. We too are scarred and wounded yet are being transformed through Christ's resurrection. Part of dying is going through a season of deconstruction where what we believed to be true about life comes into question. Like Thomas, we have our doubts whether or not we truly are going to be transformed. As we go through what Thomas Merton calls the cloud of unknowing, we hold to our beliefs loosely, and allow Jesus to come and bring new life to us. This is where transformation happens.

Divine Mercy Sunday

St. Faustina's canonisation was one of the highlights of his papacy. He died on the vigil of, and was canonised on, the Feast of Mercy. Pope John Paul II was the "spark" Jesus spoke about with St. Faustina. (Diary 1732). The Divine Mercy Devotion continues in a remarkable way through Pope Benedict XVI and Pope Francis till our days.

The Lord took his wounds with him to eternity. He is a wounded God; He let himself be injured through his love for us. His wounds are a sign that he understands and allows himself to be wounded out of love for us. These wounds of his: how tangible they are to us in the history of our time! Indeed, time and again, he allows himself to be wounded for our sake. What certainty of his mercy, what consolation do his wounds mean for us! ... And what a duty they are for us, the duty to allow ourselves in turn to be wounded for him!

Indeed, mercy is the central nucleus of the Gospel message; it is the very name of God, the Face with which he revealed himself in the Old Covenant and fully in Jesus Christ, the incarnation of creative and redemptive Love. May this merciful love also shine on the face of the Church and show itself through the sacraments, in particular that of Reconciliation, and in works of charity, both communitarian and individual. May all that the Church says and does manifest the mercy God feels for man, and therefore for us. When the Church has to recall an unrecognized truth or a betrayed good, she always does so impelled by merciful love, so that men and women may have life and have it abundantly (cf. Jn 10:10). From Divine Mercy, which brings peace to hearts, genuine peace flows into the world, peace between different peoples, cultures and religions. ~ Pope Benedict XVI



SOCIETY OF ST. VINCENT DE PAUL


A very sincere thank you for your prayers and financial support, from clients and volunteers of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul. Your spiritual and financial contributions during the past year have helped the Society in Lethbridge continue its assistance to the underprivileged and those in need.

The Society's mission is to minister to the homeless and the economically disadvantaged through home visits, assistance with shelter, delivery of donated furniture, and help with transportation costs. The Society provides compassion and support to individuals in need, regardless of race, origin, religion or gender, assisting underprivileged in their struggle against poverty.

The primary source of funds for the Society's ongoing work comes from the donations of individuals, organizations, parishes and schools. This year the Society also received a portion of the Food Security Grant, which was applied for by the Western Regional Council. Thank you to all who donated for your support this year.

Continuing with the mission of the Society, in 2023, a total of \$55,159 was paid (an increase of 4% over 2022 - \$53,148) for help toward rent (29%), utilities (40%), food assistance (25%) and other support (6% - delivery of donated furniture, emergency shelter, transportation and medical needs, etc.). The Society operated in a deficit position for most the year, however due to the grant contribution received and your generous donations, the overall year resulted in a surplus. Collections remained consistent with 2022 (but still down about 30% compared to pre-pandemic levels). The emergency assistance provided this year helped more than 500 individuals and families in the Lethbridge area and the grant funding was used to help an additional 200 individuals, including children. The Society continues to be an important and much needed service in the community, as we are continually called upon by many people each year.

Activities of the Society are carried out entirely by volunteers. Administration such as telephone for clients to contact us, stationery and postage for mailing tax receipts and tax returns, cheque printing and bank charges, and contributions to other St. Vincent de Paul Societies account for approximately 6% of total expenses.
