


St. Martha's Parish

Palm Sunday of Lent - March 24th 2024

Gospel Reflection - Mark 14:1-15:47



Jesus' entry into Jerusalem is not just a historical event, but a parable in action. God woos His city (faith is my response to God's wooing): He comes like a beggar King, so poor that He does not own even the poorest beast of burden. A humble Powerful One, who does not impose Himself, but proposes Himself; like an unarmed lover. *Blessed is He who comes*. It is extraordinary to be able to say: God comes. In this country, on these streets, in my house that smells of bread and hugs, God still comes, traveler of millennia and of hearts. He's getting closer, he's at the door. Holy Week unfolds, one by one, the days of our destiny; they come towards us slowly, each generous with signs, symbols, light. In this week, the rhythm of the liturgical year slows down, we can follow Jesus

day by day, almost hour by hour. The holiest thing we can do is to be with Him: "men and women go to God in their suffering, cry for help, ask for bread and comfort. That's what everyone does, everyone. Christians, on the other hand, remain close to God in His suffering" (Bonhoffer). They are close to a God who on the cross is no longer the "omnipotent" of our infantile desires, the lifesaver in our shipwrecks, but is the All-embracing, the All-loving who is shipwrecked in the perfect storm of love for us. These are days to be close to God in His suffering: the passion of Christ is still consumed, is alive in the infinite crosses of the world, where we can stand next to the crucifixes of history; these are the days to let ourselves be wounded by their wounds, to feel pain for the pain of earth, of God, of man, to suffer and bring comfort. The cross is disorientating, but if I persist in remaining next to it like the women, looking at it like the centurion, an expert in death, I certainly won't understand everything, but I'll get one thing: that there, in that death, is the first cry of a new world. What did the centurion see to make him, a pagan, pronounce the first Christian act of faith: "He was the Son of God"? He saw a God who loves to death. Christian faith is based on the most beautiful thing in the world: a perfect act of love. The centurion saw the world turned upside down: God who gives life even to those who give Him death; whose power is to serve rather than enslave; overcome violence not with more violence, but by taking it upon Himself. The cross is the purest, highest, most beautiful image that God has given of Himself. These are the days that reveal it: "to know who God is, I only have to kneel at the foot of the Cross" (K. Rahner).

Holy Week

We're called to hope in the God who took the single greatest evil ever perpetrated—the Crucifixion of Our Lord—and brought out of it the single greatest good the world has ever known: the redemption of humanity. If God can bring goodness and glory and beauty and life out of that kind of evil, He most certainly can bring goodness and glory and beauty and life out of the evil we presently face. Hope is what will sustain us in the days yet to come.

WHAT SHOULD I DO WITH MY BLESSED PALMS?

After leaving church on Sunday, you may be asking yourself, "What should I do with these palms?" Whatever you do, don't throw them away! According to the Code of Canon Law, blessed items are not to be discarded in a trash can, but treated with respect (cf. #1171). At Mass these palm branches were set apart by a blessing from the priest and made into a "sacramental," an object that is meant to draw us closer to the celebration of the seven sacraments. Throwing them in the trash ignores their sacred purpose and treats them like any other object we no longer need. If do not wish to keep them, please return them to the basket of used palms in the gathering space. These palms will be burned to create ashes for Ash Wednesday next year.

Ash on the head and water on the feet

This a path, apparently, is just about two metres long. But, in truth, it is a lot longer and more tiring. Because it's all about starting from your head and getting at the feet of others. The forty days from Ash Wednesday till now are not enough to cover this. It takes a whole lifetime, and the Lenten season is meant to be the reduction in scale of it.

Repentance and service. They are the two great sermons that the Church entrusts to ash and water, rather than to words. There is no believer who is not seduced by the charm of these two sermons. The others, those made from the pulpits, perhaps are forgotten immediately. These, however, are not: because they are expressed with symbols, which speak a "long-life language". It is difficult, for example, to escape the impact of that ash. Although very light, it falls on the head with the violence of hail. And it transforms into an authentic hammering that call to the only thing that matters: "Repent and believe in the Gospel." It's a shame that not everyone knows the rubric of the Missal, according to which the ashes must be obtained from olive branches blessed on the previous Palm Sunday. Otherwise, if the people knew it, the allusions to the commitment to peace, to the welcoming of Christ, to the recognition of His unique lordship, to hope for a definitive entrance into the Jerusalem of Heaven, would become a much more concrete itinerary on a path of conversion. That "shampoo of ashes", however, remains imprinted forever: well beyond the time when, among the soft hair, you'll find earthy debris on the following morning, scattered on the pillow, and this debris will make you think for a moment of the scales that have already fallen from the scabs of our sin.

Likewise, that tinkling of water in the basin remains indelible forever. It is the oldest sermon that any of us remembers. As children, we got it "heard with the eyes", full of amazement, after having elbowed among a hundred flanks, to move to the front row and spy on people's emotions up close. A sermon, that one of Holy Thursday, constructed with twelve identical sentences (twelve feet to wash): but with no monotony. Rich in tenderness, although structured on a predictable script. Devoid of rhetoric, despite the repetition of obvious actions: the offering of a foot, the lifting of a jug, the rustling of a towel, the seal of a kiss. A strange sermon. Because it is pronounced without words, kneeling in front of twelve symbols of human poverty by a man that the mind remembers kneeling only in front of consecrated hosts.

Evocative power of signs! Let us embark, then, on the Lenten journey, suspended between ashes and water. The ash burns on our heads, as if it had just come out of the crater of a volcano. To quench the heat, let's start looking for water to be poured on... other people's feet. Repentance and service. The only tracks upon which to lay the path of our return home. Ash and water. Once upon a time, primordial ingredients of laundry soap. But, above all, symbols of a complete conversion, which is supposed to finally grip us from head to toe. *T. Bello*

Paschal Triduum

The Easter Triduum or Holy Triduum is the three-day celebration of the Paschal Mystery: the Passion, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ

DAY 1: sundown on Holy Thursday to sundown on Good Friday

DAY 2: sundown on Good Friday to sundown on Holy Saturday

DAY 3: sundown on Holy Saturday to sundown on Easter Sunday PASCHAL: associated with the Hebrew Passover; referring to Jesus as the Lamb of God TRIDUUM: derived from the Latin for three days

The Paschal mystery has two aspects: by his death, Christ liberates us from sin; by his Resurrection, he opens for us the way to a new life.

The Paschal Triduum bridges the seasons of **Lent** to **Easter**.

In the Sacred Triduum, the Church solemnly celebrate the greatest mysteries of our redemption, keeping by mean of special celebrations the memorial of her Lord, crucified buried, and risen.

The Roman Missal

HOLY THURSDAY:

"Jesus gives himself to us as food and, in the washing of feet, teaches us the need to serve others."

GOOD FRIDAY:

"In the mystery of Christ's death on the cross, we contemplate that undying divine love which embraces all mankind and summons us in turn to love one another in the power of the Spirit."

HOLY SATURDAY:

"The day of God's silence - invites us not only to solidarity with all who are abandoned and alone, but also to trust in that faithful love which turns death into life."
